

In this central act of Christian worship, as the bread and wine are brought before God, so we offer ourselves to him, bringing to him our joys and sorrows, our thanksgivings and our concerns. When we receive Holy Communion, we receive Christ himself, and, thus nourished, we go out from worship to service, to live our Christian lives for others.

Christian worship is offered in the beauty of holiness. We are given a small foretaste of the inexpressible worship of heaven as through beautiful vestments, mystery, music and the traditional ceremonies of the Church we bring before God all the very best we have to offer.

We hope this booklet will guide you through the service and help you to enter into the movement of Christ's self-offering at the heart of our Eucharist.

THE EUCHARIST IN LENT

INTRODUCTION

The characteristic notes of Lent are self-examination, penitence, selfdenial, study and preparation for Easter. Our Lenten worship reflects these themes in its austerity: vestments of purple are worn, there are no flowers in church, the *Gloria in Excelsis* is not sung, we deny ourselves our joyful *Alleluias* until Easter and the Eucharist begins with the singing of Lent Prose in procession, which is both an act of penance and an extended intercession for the Church, the world, and ourselves.

The season has its origins in an extended period of preparation by candidates for baptism. Those who had been excluded from the fellowship of the Church for serious sin also prepared themselves for readmission to communion by fasting and penance during this time. In the course of time the whole Christian community came to recognise that, by a careful keeping of these days, all might take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel.

The tradition of a forty-day Lent parallels the time our Lord spent in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry. Eventually this became the norm in the West as Christians prepared themselves for the celebration of his Easter victory. We prepare for the joyous feast of Easter and our participation in the Paschal mystery – Christ's death, resurrection and glorious ascension.

Lent is often likened to a journey with Good Friday and Easter as its destination. From the start on Ash Wednesday, our Lenten journey takes us forward in eager expectation. St. Paul used the image of an athlete as a model or preparation for the Christian life. It is also a useful image for Lent. Baptism crowns the season at Easter.

Except on Ash Wednesday, when all say

Almighty God,

we thank you for feeding us with the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Through him we offer you our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory. Amen.

THE HOLY EUCHARIST

The Gathering

In Lent we begin by STANDING for the Lent Prose. At the entry of the ministers, the verses are sung by the choir, with the congregation joining in the refrain.



LENT PROSE

Refrain: Hear us, O Lord, have mercy upon us: for we have sinn-ed against thee.

> I To thee, Redeemer, on thy throne of glory: lift we our weeping eyes in holy pleadings: listen, O Jesu, to our supplications. [Refrain]

2 O thou chief Corner-stone, Right Hand of the Father Way of Salvation, Gate of Life Celestial cleanse thou our sinful souls from all defilement. [Refrain]

3 God, we implore thee, in thy glory seated bow down and hearken to thy weeping children pity and pardon all our grievous trespasses. [Refrain]

4 Sins oft committed now we lay before thee with true contrition, now no more we veil them grant us, Redeemer, loving absolution. [Refrain]

5 Innocent, captive, taken unresisting falsely accused, and for us sinners sentenced, save us, we pray thee, Jesu our Redeemer. [Refrain] We all come to the Eucharist with our own particular needs and with prayers for ourselves and for others. We bring them to the Lord in the time of silence. We bring to God all those things for which we are sorry, our sins of commission and omission.

A PRIVATE PRAYER OF PREPARATION

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen. If you do not wish to receive communion you are warmly invited to come forward for a blessing. Please cross your arms as an indication to the ministers.

During the distribution, hymns and anthems may be sung. Any consecrated bread and wine which is not required for the purposes of communion is consumed at the end of the distribution or reserved for the communion of the sick.

Prayer after Communion

Silence is kept.

The president says "Let us pray" and the Post Communion or another suitable prayer is said.

All say

All Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent; create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness, through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

PRAYER AFTER RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

The Greeting

The president greets the people, who remain standing.

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

Prayer of Penitence

The deacon invites us to confess our sins in these or other appropriate words

The sacrifice of God is a broken spirit a broken and contrite heart God will not despise. Let us come to the Lord who is full of compassion, and acknowledge our transgressions in penitence and faith.

All Lord God,

we have sinned against you; we have done evil in your sight. We are sorry and repent. Have mercy on us according to your love. Wash away our wrongdoing and cleanse us from our sin. Renew a right spirit within us and restore us to the joy of your salvation, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The President says

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who in his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with heartfelt repentance and true faith turn to him: have mercy on *you*; pardon and deliver *you* from all your sins; and bring *you* to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The president sums up or "collects" the prayers of all our hearts in the words of the Collect of the day.

Giving of Communion

The president says these or other suitable words of invitation.

This is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world: our Passover sacrificed for us, our peace and reconciliation. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

- All Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.
- All We do not presume to come to this your table, merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table. But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ and to drink his blood,

The president and people receive communion.

Breaking of the Bread

The president breaks the consecrated bread.

Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup:

All we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

We all sing Agnus Dei as the bread is broken.



¶The Creed we use in Lent is a baptismal text, asking the candidates to confess the Faith. Traditionally baptisms would happen at Easter with *Lent as the time of preparation. In the Early Church, those preparing for* baptism were called 'catechumens', from the word which we still use, 'Catechism', which in times past all those preparing for confirmation would learn. Some of you may remember having to learn this, which began with the questions, 'What is your name?' and then, 'Who gave you that name?' The Catechism is a summary of the main content of the Christian faith.

The Nicene Creed may be said on occasion in Lent.

THE CREED

President

Do you believe and trust in God the Father?

All I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe and trust in his Son Jesus Christ?

All I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe and trust in the Holy Spirit?

All I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Amen.

The prayers are introduced by the president and led by a member of the congregation.

We KNEEL (or SIT) for the intercessions.

Finally we commend to thy fatherly goodness all those who are in any ways afflicted, or distressed, in mind, body or estate; that it may please thee to comfort and relieve them, according to their several necessities, giving them patience under their sufferings, and a happy issue out of all their afflictions.

And this we beg for Jesus Christ, his sake. Amen.

The Book of Common Prayer

The Peace is not first and foremost a show of human friendship. It is an affirmation of our common identity as the Body of Christ, that "we are very members incorporate in the mystical body" of God's Son. By exchanging the Peace with our neighbours we express our determination to be reconciled with God and with one another.

Peace, perfect peace, in this dark world of sin? The blood of Jesus whispers peace within. Peace, perfect peace, death shadowing us and ours? Jesus has vanquished death and all its powers.

Passiontide Preface (from the fifth Sunday of Lent)

It is indeed right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty. The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified. He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and saying:

People may wish to SIT or KNEEL at this point.

Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be to us his body and blood;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples saying: Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper, he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of your kingdom, and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord.

Jesus Christ is Lord:

All Lord, by your cross and resurrection you have set us free. You are the Saviour of the world.

A HYMN is sung.

The table is prepared and bread and wine are placed upon it. The president takes the bread and wine.

Prayers at the preparation of the table

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation: through your goodness we have this bread to set before you, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life. **Blessed be God for ever.**
